MOLLY KELLY - GOV CANDIDATE




In the wake of the 2016 elections, and in the midst of Donald Trump's presidency and Governor Chris Sununu's

taking New Hampshire in the wrong direction, I cannot be a bystander. Instead, I'm determined to improve the lives of the people of our state. And that's why I'm running for governor.

We must make NH a more attractive place for young people and families to live, and we can start by finally passing paid family medical leave. Everyone should be able to be with family in a time of crisis, and I'm committed to making paid family medical leave a reality.

So many issues we face today also came up when I served in the state Senate. I'm proud of my progressive track record in the legislature, where I stood up for public schools and students; defended Planned Parenthood; helped to pass marriage equality; advocated for common sense gun safety measures; propelled our state to a clean energy future; sounded the alarm on the opioid epidemic; and fought for working families. Being progressive and fighting for these issues isn't new to me.

We have an opportunity – an obligation – to come together to win back the governorship. I

hope you'll join me to put NH back on the right course.

On November 6th, there is no substitute for victory.




KERMIT WILLIAMS - NH REP, D4

As I write this, the media are full of discussions about the Trump administration's horrendous border policies. While New Hampshire state representatives can do very little about federal law, these stories remind me of two things; how important it is to put our state and country back on the right track again, and how one of our most important jobs is to protect those who can do the least to protect themselves.

Unfortunately, that list is long. Children, the poor, the elderly, disabled, and immigrants all fit that category. While we have had some limited success with Medicaid expansion, our social safety net has many holes. Despite our best efforts, we were unable to pass a family and medical leave insurance program that would have provided both financial assistance and job protection for employees who need to take time off from work to care for a relative or to deal with an illness of their own. I received an award from the Campaign for a Family-Friendly Economy for my efforts on behalf of this program. While I appreciated the recognition, it seemed hollow because, while the bill passed the House, it was killed in the Senate. There is always next year, but that means at least another year before such a critical program is available to New Hampshire residents, while Massachusetts just passed the plan and other states have had it for a while.

That is just the latest example where a patch to the safety net failed to hold. Our state's support for the developmentally disabled, for instance, ranges from weak to failing, depending on your perspective. Parents with disabled children would surely rate state services a failure. For a state whose history in this area includes the Laconia State School, you would think we might have learned our lesson.

I could continue to point out safety net failures for several pages, but that would both be too



long an article and too depressing. I have to remind myself that years of bad choices will take years to repair. And that is why I am running again to be one of your state reps.

When you are in the minority, success can sometimes be measured by just showing up. I pride myself on never missing a voting session in my six years as a rep. I am very committed to this job, even at \$100 per year. I have written five to ten bills each year, and passed about half of them. I have served on many study committees, served for all six years on the Hillsborough County Executive committee, and am currently vice chair of our Economic Justice caucus. I take pride in my Republican committee chair's complaining I am too good at defending the Democratic position in our committee. I am in line to be vice chair of the Commerce committee if we can take the majority again.

I have taken a special focus on workforce development, because as one of the oldest states, and with a very low unemployment rate, our future economic success depends on growing our workforce. As people retire, we need new residents to replace them, or companies will move elsewhere. A strong economy is both important to our residents and the only way we can raise enough revenue to have a complete state budget.

There are many more priorities we need to work on. Perhaps we can discuss the ones most important to you when we meet on the campaign trail. I hope to spend a lot of time in Francestown. And of course, I will be deeply appreciative to receive your votes in November.

JIM BOSMAN - NH REP, D38




I am running for State Representative and I am seeking your support. New Hampshire needs dedicated individuals who will advocate for quality education





THE NHDP CONVENTION

The NHDP Mid-Term Convention was held in Stratham on June 23rd. Delegates were welcomed by Annie Kuster via a video, taped that morning on the tarmac, as the Congresswoman was boarding a plane headed to the immigrant detention facilities at the Texan border. Her message underscored our party's support for the humane treatment of immigrants and asylum seekers and our



opposition to the "Zero Tolerance" Policy that heartlessly separates parents from their children.

After hearing from the 11 Congressional candidates, running in the District 1 Democratic primary for Carol Shea –Porter's seat, delegates were addressed by the two Democratic gubernatorial candidates, Steve Marchand and Molly Kelly. Several of the speeches were electrifying and drew enthusiastic applause from the audience. It was inspirational to see the wide range of energetic candidates, from Gen X to Baby Boomers, with a variety of skill sets and personal stories, that were stepping up to run for public office.
